

In 2022, more people came to us in need of resettlement support than I remember in my 20 years with World Relief, and I am so grateful for the strength of our community. You have been amazing as you sacrifice, give, and **show love to our new neighbors**.

No one can completely prepare for the uncertainty that lies within a year. Global conflicts that cause mass displacement like Ukraine, Afghanistan, and Venezuela. Decisions that bring unexpected busloads of asylum seekers to neighboring communities. And the ongoing needs of many refugees and immigrants who depend on others to walk alongside them as they rebuild their lives. With challenges like these, it's easy to feel a sense of helplessness.

And yet, **together we rose to the challenges** and have had an impact far greater than any one of us could have alone. At World Relief, we believe God has given all of us gifts & resources to be stewarded for the good of others and for our community. In 2022, we embodied a community of faith and action leading to 665 people being resettled and over 6,000 served through World Relief Chicagoland.

A Venezuelan asylum seeker experiences hope when her new home provides her with the safety she longed for.

When I consider how the impact of moments like these is multiplied across the thousands of people who actively participate in the work of welcome – volunteers, foundations, refugees and immigrants, businesses, financial partners, church members, and World Relief Chicagoland staff, I'm awestruck at its magnitude.

A STORY OF IMPACT

hen three couples from Park Community Church, Rogers Park decided to partner with asylum seekers through World Relief's HOME program, they realized the financial commitment was a big undertaking. The amount: \$8,400 to provide rental assistance for six months while the family obtained work authorization to support themselves.

Yet despite some uneasiness about raising these funds, they agreed to move forward, "Simply because there's a lot of need and not many people who wanted to do it." That is until they found what brought the most impact: they invited others to join them.

After all, tied to each person was a background of other people - family, friends, colleagues, acquaintances, and church relationships - who also cared for the lost, the forgotten, and the stranger. When everyone realized they had connections to call on for help, it became much easier than they thought possible. "It seemed like a really big number," expressed one team member. **"But I underestimated how many** people's hearts are willing to do a big number."

Before they knew it, they not only reached their goal. They realized they could have doubled it. It wasn't long before they had the chance to call upon these eager hearts again. After meeting Koffi and Emefa for the first time, they discovered this Togolese couple had another big need. They were expecting a baby and had nothing to prepare for her arrival.

The team didn't hesitate to invite others to join them, but this time helpers came from a surprising source: Facebook Marketplace. After explaining the situation to people selling baby products, sellers were happy to offer these items for free. In fact, when it came time to pick them up, **people they had never met before asked if anything else was needed**.

Amazed at the generous response, the team collected everything a baby could need – both from people they knew and complete strangers.

Looking back, the team views their walk alongside Koffi and Emefa as a fun and fulfilling experience. They built new friendships. They grew stronger together as each member stepped up in different ways to play their part. And with only a simple invitation, they witnessed how God moved in the hearts of others to help build a strong community of welcome.

INDIVIDUALS

ach one of us was created to make an impact - and at World Relief Chicagoland, we believe that desire comes from God. However, at times, we may question whether we have what it takes to respond to the needs of our neighbors. We may even think that the job of welcoming immigrants and refugees is best left to those who do not have to navigate cultural differences or communicate across languages.

But people were created for connection.

Believing that each person was designed to live in relationship, World Relief Chicagoland looks for opportunities to bring people together – and connect people like you who are passionate about loving others with the chance to welcome new immigrant and refugee neighbors to the community. And when you step up to the challenge, you get to witness incredible things.

A volunteer team of three couples from Park Community Church in Rogers Park are a beautiful example of that. Last year, Vincent and Ashlee, Jason and Samantha, and Kent and Jillian began volunteering with World Relief Chicagoland's HOME Program – an opportunity to walk alongside a family of asylum seekers, providing friendship and meaningful support for six months.

Though the team members were nervous about building a friendship with Koffi and Emefa, asylum seekers from Togo, they soon learned that so much power comes from simply being together – offering friendship, sharing meals, and supporting one another.



J illian shared that she worried about the language differences initially, but soon realized that even if they ran out of topics to discuss using Google Translate, that it would be okay, "We're going to sit here and smile at each other. And that's fine because we're being together." Kent added, "Sometimes it's okay to not have to talk the whole time. It's just about being there and hanging out."

The tea provided truly meaningful support to Koffi and Emefa – they fundraised among friends and family to cover six months of rent for the couple, hosted a baby shower when Emefa was expecting their first baby, brought the new family of three home from the hospital when baby Vicky was born, and shared regular meals together throughout 2022. However, the team also learned that there was a power in simply bearing witness to each other's lives. Team member Ashlee shared, "Just spending time with them and hearing the little bits and secrets of their story reminds me that you never know what someone has gone through. It's been eye-opening to learn people's journeys to get here and the trials they've gone through."

VOLUNTEERS



When you volunteer with World Relief Chicagoland, you join a community of over 1,000 other neighbors who share their time, energy, and talents to **build a strong community of love and welcome**.

Whether providing transportation from the airport or to a job interview, sorting donations, tutoring an ESL student, advocating for just laws, setting up an apartment, or walking alongside a refugee family, each person and volunteer team plays a vital role in offering friendship to immigrants and refugees in our community.

World Relief Chicagoland provides diverse volunteer opportunities to help someone find the part that best fits their passion, skills, and schedule while building life-changing relationships. One inspirational example of this is seen in the story of Farzana and Whitney.

When Whitney signed up to volunteer, she appreciated the care World Relief Chicagoland put into matching her with an opportunity that best fit her background and interests. She became a health advocate for Afghan Paralympian and Humanitarian Parolee, Farzana.

"They were really thoughtful in terms of who they paired me with," reflects Whitney who is an occupational therapist with a long-held desire to help refugees.

As an advocate, Whitney walked alongside Farzana to help her navigate the American healthcare system to receive needed services. In turn, Farzana showed Whitney hospitality – making her coffee while they practiced English together. It was these normal routines that forged a beautiful friendship that continues today.

World Relief Chicagoland is so grateful for volunteers like Whitney who are building a strong community of welcome as they walk alongside immigrants and refugees.

CHURCHES

More than 250 church partners across Chicagoland played a central part in the mission of World Relief Chicagoland in 2022.

For over 40 years, new and long-time church partners have continued to mobilize small groups and entire congregations to welcome new neighbors. From acts of service as tutors, friendship partners, and transportation assistants, to acts of giving through donations, special offerings, and other contributions, church communities become powerful agents of change and ambassadors of hope when they step out in faith to help immigrants and refugees in vulnerable situations.



WELCOMING NEW ARRIVALS



As temperatures dropped last fall, South Park Church in Park Ridge partnered with World Relief's office in Chicago to provide winter coats and other seasonal clothing items to recently arrived immigrants and refugees. Church members continued to meet the needs of arriving families and individuals by hosting another Welcome Kit donation drive to collect essential household items.

We're grateful for their investment of time, resources, and energy to coordinate donation drives to bless others.

SERVING WITHOUT LIMIT



Batavia Covenant Church in Batavia is fostering a strong culture of service. In 2022, they collected Welcome Kits full of essentials for new refugee arrivals, enlisted volunteers to build relationships with refugee families, and created opportunities for their youth to grow as leaders by serving too.

Recently, in a special service, the congregation was asked who had served with World Relief. Over 80% of this midsize congregation raised their hands.



GIVING ABOVE AND BEYOND

With the influx of Afghans evacuated to the U.S., Christ Community Church in St. Charles responded generously to meet Afghan arrivals' pressing needs. Members stepped up with great enthusiasm to give financially, far surpassing what the church had initially expected they might be able to give.

As a result of the church's multiple generous gifts, 775 Afghans in the broader community gain resources to help with housing and their basic needs and vital longterm services through World Relief Chicagoland.

Many cherish the geography, culture, history, and traditions of their home country and mourn the beloved people and places they leave behind.

WHEN PEOPLE FLEE THEIR HOMES,

It is often because of poverty, natural disasters, violence or war, persecution, or the desire to achieve a better life for themselves or their families.

Many do not have a choice but were forced to leave their home behind in order to live or care for their families. Others are drawn to the promise of opportunity and freedom in the United States.

IMMIGRANT

Immigrants move away from their homes to live in a new country. They may be forced to leave due to persecution or may choose to leave to pursue new opportunities

determines things like the kind of support they receive from international agencies like **UNHCR** or the **U.S. Government**, whether they can work or receive benefits, and the path to becoming a U.S. citizen.

Asylum seekers flee their homes under the threat of violence and persecution. They must come to the U.S. border and present their case for asylum to U.S. adjudicators, who determine whether they can stay in the U.S. permanently as an "asylee."

REFUGEE

Refugees are displaced path from their home countries because of a threat to their lives or freedom. They are protected under an international legal framework and brought to the U.S. by the U.S. Government in partnership with agencies like World Relief.

Every person has God-given dignity and worth and should be treated with respect and welcomed with love.


Each of us has the opportunity to walk alongside immigrants and refugees who come to the U.S. from around the world so that they can **flourish**.


